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#### Strand 2

Locate, access, and use information.

#### **Big Ideas:**

- Libraries are places that are specifically organized to help people efficiently search for books and information.
- Some materials are better than others for meeting information needs.
- Citing sources protects intellectual property.
- Information found in print or online sources are verified by using more than one source.

## **Key Outcomes**:

Students will demonstrate an understanding of **how to locate**, **access and use information** by being able to:

- With assistance, choose an appropriate information source.
- Using an organizational tool, extract, sort and sequence information
- Indicate the source of information.

## **Essential Knowledge and Skills:**

- Ask meaningful questions to meet information needs.
- With assistance, develop criteria for relevant information: authority, accuracy, relevancy and currency of source.
- Use the online catalog to record the call number and find a book in the library with assistance or independently.
- Identify the parts of a book including barcode and spine label
- Make decisions about appropriate choices by looking at titles, details, fiction/nonfiction designations, and cover pictures when available.
- Compare and contrast information from different sources.
- Become aware of ethical issues such as plagiarism and copy right law

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#### Strand 3

Organize, research, and construct an informative product; evaluate the process and product.

## **Big Ideas:**

- Information comes from many sources.
- Information can be understood and restated in words and pictures.
- Final product conveys correct and documented information in a clear format.

## **Key Outcomes**:

Students will demonstrate an understanding of **organizing research**, **constructing an informative product and evaluating the process and product** by being able to:

- Present a final product using an appropriate format: a report, poster, electronic program, readers' theater, or other medium.
- Judge the process using guiding questions
- Judge the product using criteria.

#### **Essential Knowledge and Skills:**

- Articulate and practice the research process of seeking, reporting and evaluating information.
- Listen, learn and respond to peer presentations.
- Conference with peers, teachers, and library teacher during the creation and evaluation of the product.
- Use provided checklist or rubric to determine if the product is complete and accurate.
- Use standard format in citing all information sources.

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### **Strand 4**

Appreciate and select literature.

### **Big Ideas:**

- Libraries offer a variety of materials for information and pleasure reading.
- Story elements, genres, and merits of text and illustrations enhance the enjoyment of literature.

#### **Key Outcomes:**

Students will demonstrate an understanding of **literature appreciation and selection** by being able to:

- Identify literature from various cultures and genres.
- Identify basic story elements.
- Make predictions in literature.
- Independently select an appropriate book for reading ability and interest.

## **Essential Knowledge and Skills:**

- Demonstrate active listening skills.
- Make connections among materials read, heard or viewed.
- Use vocabulary to describe elements of story and genre
