

Third Graders are Problem Solvers!

Second Step is a comprehensive curriculum for Social-Emotional Learning. The Social Worker, School Psychologist, METCO Director and I go into classrooms weekly to teach the Second Step lessons to third and fourth grade classes. We watch videos, talk about scenarios, and learn about social-emotional concepts and skills. During one of our class discussions, a student surfaced a truth about the problem-solving steps we had been learning about - *The problem solving steps are great...but kids don't really use them.*

When we dug a little deeper into this problem-solving problem, the students realized that they weren't using the steps because they were too upset, angry or stressed. This realization signaled a need to link back to previous learning about the brain and lessons about calming down. When you have strong feelings, it's hard for your brain to think. The feeling part of the brain can take over! When this happens, it's like you "flip your lid" or lose control of the thinking part of your brain. (Second Step Grade 3. Committee for Children, 2011.) We learned that in order to calm down, we have to stop, name the feeling, and use a strategy like breathing, counting or using positive self-talk. Once we are calm, we can think about using the problem-solving steps.






Third graders and their teacher identify the pre-frontal cortex – the part of the brain that helps us think, make decisions, have a personality and be social.
