Phyllis Custance

Administrative Secretary at Hanscom Middle School Tribute by Erich Ledebuhr, HMS Principal

One afternoon, Phyllis and I were talking about all of the different jobs that she has held for the school district. In typical Phyllis fashion, the next morning she presented me with a printed list of all the jobs she has held and the years she worked those jobs. When looking at her starting year of 1970, I came to the realization that Phyllis has worked the equivalent of my entire life for the Lincoln Public Schools. Talk about dedication and commitment to a school system. That is a tremendous tenure. Not only is Phyllis meticulous about her job but because of her tenure and great memory she is also a historian for the school and district.

Phyllis not only works in Lincoln, but she grew up in Lincoln and raised her family here as well. She moved to Lincoln with her family when she was in the second grade and attended The Little Red School House, which was a two-room school for second and third grade. It is now the Masonic Temple. She then went on to third and fourth grade at what is now town offices. Phyllis went back to the Little Red School House for half of fifth grade until they moved to the new Smith School where she was part of the first class to graduate from that school. She attended Concord High School because back then, there was a choice to go to either Concord or Weston for High School.

Phyllis has had many jobs over the years working for Lincoln Public Schools. She started working in Lincoln in 1970 as a bus monitor. In 1971, she started as a teacher's aide in a 2 / 3 classroom for the teacher she had in second grade!!! She took a few years off to raise her family and started back in 1975 as a teacher's aide for the chorus director. She then continued as an aide for the Resource Room over the next several years as well as helping out with the chorus director and in the Library. From 1979 to 1998, Phyllis went from teacher's aide to resource room coordinator and also filled in for secretaries in Hartwell and Smith when they needed her. In 1998, Bill Warren said, "We have this position open I think you could do, do you want it"? Phyllis said, "Yes," and the rest is history. The position was for Administrative Secretary at Hanscom Middle School. It was the first position in her long career for Lincoln that she interviewed for. Phyllis was also one of the first members of the Secretary's Union!

Here is Phyllis' career by the numbers. She has:

- worked in 2 schools Smith and Hanscom Middle School
- worked for 6 principals at Hanscom Middle School
- seen 10 superintendents come and go
- registered about 4000 students at HMS alone
- worked for 47 years for Lincoln Public schools

Each year when I have the opportunity to speak about a retiree, I make the comment that it is more difficult to do each progressive year because my tenure has been longer, and I have had a longer time to build a relationship with that person. Well, on top of getting to know Phyllis over the last ten years, she is also an integral part of my daily life in a different way from one of our teachers. She is part of the office team. Together with Mary Gately, the three of us have been able to form a bond and work so well as a team. If you've never spent a full day in a middle school office, you are lucky! We see it all--smiles, tears of joy, tears of sadness, anger, frustration, blood, lost teeth, law enforcement and contentious situations, nervous new students and parents, students and parents who are sad they are leaving, family reunions when parents return from deployments, and of course, every emotion that a student, parent, faculty or staff member could ever feel or express. Yet through it all, one thing has remained constant for Phyllis and that is her vigilance to the job and the mission of the school. Phyllis has lived and excelled at this mission.

As the principal of the school, Phyllis has been one of my first lines of defense. She has been a supporter, cheerleader, sounding board, and has been there to offer advice or critique when needed. If I do my job right, most of the public only gets to see a smiling, calm demeanor. Phyllis, however, has had the opportunity to see all of the other sides of the picture when things aren't always smooth, and she has been a

rock of support throughout my tenure. It is safe to say that I would not be able to do my job effectively without her, and for that reason, someone is going to have a really hard time filling her shoes.

Hanscom Primary School Art Teacher *Tribute by Elaine Herzog, HPS Colleague*

You might think that a math and art teacher would form an unlikely pairing, but Donna and I talked endlessly of the many connections between art and math – the art of balance, optical illusions, folding paper geometry, spirals, features of lines, string art, teaching students how to use scissors and rulers. Perhaps most importantly, we talked about encouraging students to trust their instincts, take risks and learn from their mistakes.

As a math teacher, I have a fondness for quantifying things, so I'd like to share Donna's career by the numbers (many of which are approximated). Donna has worked for the Lincoln Pubic Schools since 1987 – that's 32 years. She has taught roughly 10,000 students, written approximately 200,000 report cards, and worked under at least seven different superintendents. Donna served as the Teacher on Assignment for 11 years and has been an LTA rep on and off throughout her tenure. She also acted as Team Leader at least twice for our Specialist Team. During that time, she designed a visual process for figuring out our building

schedule so that we could piece it together like a puzzle. It was brilliant, and the school held onto it for many years.

Donna has written between 20 and 25 Lincoln School Foundation grants. These grants ranged from attending conferences to bringing people in to enrich students' experiences with artists. She wrote a Folk Art grant and created a beautiful folk art gallery in the old HPS. Recently, she's been awarded grants to bring in Oaxacan weavers and painters in a collaborative effort with Karen Hughes, our Spanish FLES teacher.

Donna loves to bring art to the wider community as well. She initiated the Hanscom Family Day at the deCordova nine years ago. She worked tirelessly to encourage Hanscom families to explore art in the local area. Every year she has taken kids to a museum – at first the MFA in Boston, and then later, the Worcester Art Museum. Not only did she highlight art in the community, she elevated kids' art by making it easily accessible to families via Artsonia. For the past 15 years, she used this platform to share kids' art with their families. It was a wildly successful endeavor. She's shared 37,000 pieces of student work, which has had over 226,000 visitors and 12,600 comments.

But now I want to share with you some of things that are harder to quantify that make Donna so valued at HPS as a teacher and colleague.

Donna is the first person to help anyone problem solve ANY dilemma and will likely find a way to collaborate with you on it. She'll sprinkle in some of her mojo thoughts, and before you know it, together you've brewed up a solution that not just solves your problem but connects to something she's doing in the art room as well – AND it's fantastic for kids. You see, Donna is 100 percent committed to developing not just children's creativity but the creativity of all those with whom she works. She engages in her work in a very public way - inviting others to contribute and participate, all in the service of student learning. Donna values having kids think for themselves. She'll say, "Say it once, and don't repeat it. Don't draw on kids' papers! Kids CAN do their own work." Donna believes in teaching skills too. She wants kids to learn proper techniques because she knows that once mastered, these skills will unleash even greater artistic potential. She put together how-to videos to increase student engagement so kids can watch them over and over and even from home. Donna is fully grounded in the day-to-day skills kids need and thinks about how she can support them, such as shoe tying, how to use glue sticks, keeping track of marker caps, holding a straightedge – Donna has a system and method for everything.

As a colleague, Donna has our backs. She advocates for staff members and students, so we have a smooth-running school. She can be relied upon to respectfully voice concerns and raise awareness when others are shy to do so. As a friend, she shares her personal joys – Farmer Dave, her infamous dog Taffy Cuddlepants, her travels, her family, her passion for yoga, great shoes and clothes. Have you seen her on one of our theme days? She has such fun dressing up for theme days! Donna truly cares about everything that's going on in the school and everyone in it.

We'll feel her loss – no matter who fills her role, there's only one Donna.

Becky Eston is a gifted educator, and she is a gift to education. As we heard in the speeches honoring this Lincoln School educator of 39 years, there is moment-to-moment-magic in K103. The magic is in the way Becky thinks about teaching and learning; the way Becky interacts with students, parents and colleagues; the way she keenly observes how her students approach a task, a problem, a discovery. I can't think of a time when I've walked into K103 when Becky hasn't said, "You have to see this incredible thing" and then shared a piece of writing, a drawing, or the letter-sound assessment for a student who started the year knowing only a few letters and grew over the course of a few months to know so many more. Becky says, "We meet kids where they are and get them as far as they can go." The kids go far...

Last week, Lincoln School alumni who just graduated from Lincoln-Sudbury Regional High School came back to the Lincoln School as part of their senior week activities. The class of 2019 introduced themselves and shared a memory, their plans or advice. We were all moved to hear their appreciation for their time at the Lincoln School and how meaningful their closeness as a group is to them. When I went to talk to Becky – yes, I am one of the many people who frequently consult, pop-in, wish that I'd booked a meeting in advance, and always feel grateful that she is so generous with her time ... as I was saying, when I went to talk to Becky about the seniors, she pulled me right over to her bulletin board covered with class pictures. One picture has a sticky note that reads "graduating this year" and she pointed to one of the students and said, "He's the one who..." and told me what some of the impressive seniors that I had just met were like in kindergarten.

How does she do this? As I said, she is a gifted educator... Becky says that although she is a seasoned teacher, every year is new because the students are new. She takes the time to understand and truly know

each child. When I was reading report card comments this past January, I had to stop and send Becky and email that read, "Your comments are superb. The detail and descriptions of each student show the depth of your relationship with students, your knowledge of their academic and developmental milestones, and your passion for celebrating success and ensuring that all kids are growing, no matter where they are. Your comments check all of the boxes for meaningful feedback. The students and their families are so lucky to have you!"

Susan's deep knowledge of things mathematical is awe-inspiring. She is a curious learner with her students, often looking at solutions on the board and puzzling with them about alternative ways to get to an answer. When Susan says, "May I?" to her students, they know that it will be followed by her working out the problem and modeling for them flexible mathematical thinking. Her care for her students extends

children, knows exactly when to pop seamlessly in and suggest a break, or put a hand on a shoulder. Her natural ability to relate to and nurture children made our classroom what it was. (Jillian didn't say it so I want to be sure everyone knows what a busy and happy classroom K107 is!) Kathleen also has that way with the adults around her. She took such good care of me in all our years together and always knew when a team member needed a pick me up, a birthday card or a shared sweet treat. She is also a lifelong learner, and she always said she loved working with different teachers and young teachers (though we all got old on her!) and learning from the different styles and techniques she saw. Through her last years, Kathleen was looking for resources and ideas to support different learners in our room."

In her 13 years at the Lincoln School, Kathleen has been an instructional assistant in many grades - we think it was in all but grade 2 – and with the specialists. We admire the way she stays calm in challenging situations, and we are grateful for her commitment to children and making connections with the children who need it the most. Kathleen has been a part of our mentor program – meeting with a student for snack or a walk to help a child feel connected and supported. She has worked closely with the entire kindergarten team and been a colleague and friend to all. Congratulations on your retirement, Kathleen, and thank you for your dedication and generous compassion for the students and staff at the Lincoln School.
