
Dear LPS Community,

Last night, the Lincoln School Building Committee met to review the outcomes of going out to bid for the construction portion of the Lincoln School project that is slated to begin in June. As construction bids have come in for the school building project, the total bid value has exceeded our budget for the project by 3.5 million dollars. This is forcing us to make some significant cuts from the 100% design to remove elements from the project. These cuts are going to be hard and feel frustrating, and perhaps dispiriting, at this juncture in the project. However, this is the process working – we are confronting the real costs of the project now, before work has begun, so we are sure we are building within the budget the community has provided. This is not unlike what would happen if a homeowner was planning a big kitchen remodeling project, and when they received quotes from contractors, the quotes were all higher than what the homeowner had budgeted. Tough choices to cut some aspects of the project would need to be made. Maybe the counters will be Corian instead of quartz, the island will be 10 sq./ft. smaller, and the old refrigerator will be kept until it needs to be replaced. While it is disappointing to have to make these decisions, the homeowner will still be getting a wonderful new kitchen.

And, we will still be getting a wonderful new building. The climate in the building will be better for learning with a new, modern heating and cooling system that will end the days of oppressive temperatures in classrooms in June and September. Flexible learning spaces, including grade level hubs in grades 3-8, a Learning Commons, and small group rooms at all grade levels, will help us better meet the learning needs of all students. The community's commitment to the environment will be embodied by a fully net zero building that produces as much energy as it consumes. The singlestory, L-shaped layout that is so valued by the community has been retained. The Reed Gym will be connected to the rest of the school, improving security and safety and keeping students out of the rain, sleet, and snow when going to lunch or wellness. The Preschool will move into the school building facilitating music, art, and wellness opportunities for preschool students. Outdated, ad-hoc network cabling and the aging roof will be completely replaced, and the building will be brought up to all current building and safety codes. The auditorium audio, visual, and theatrical lighting systems will be upgraded to better serve Town Meeting, student productions, school activities, and many other functions. Student lunches will be served and eaten in a full kitchen and a dedicated dining commons, eliminating the limitations of serving elementary lunches from a warming kitchen and giving gym space back to the wellness program. All of these improvements represent the priorities identified during the design phase, and they are all still part of the project, along with many other improvements.

The project values have remained at the forefront of our conversations and decision-making throughout the design process. Although we have had to make adjustments to the design, the building will meet the 5 Project Values established.

So, with all the good that still is in the project, what did we need to do to ensure that we have a viable project? The SBC has approved a slate of project reductions that will get our budget back on track. The School Committee and project leadership will be initiating conversations with the Board of Selectmen, the Lincoln Finance Committee, and other town entities about possible ways to address the deep design reductions we have identified. We are exploring every possible way to reinstate the most important reductions.

The approved slate of reductions puts the project back on budget, and the project will move forward. If no additional savings or funding is realized, this is what the reductions will encompass. Approximately \$500,000 of the \$3.5M gap is being addressed through changes to construction strategy with no impact to the project scope. On the exterior of the building, most of the concrete plazas and walkways outside of the school will be replaced with bituminous concrete (asphalt) or grass, new bike and walkways will be eliminated, fifty percent of new playground equipment will be reduced, and sun control devices (louvres) will be eliminated in some areas. Inside the building, some casework in the existing building will be reused where new casework was originally planned. Wood benches and some built-in display cases will be eliminated. In the auditorium, the seats and carpet will not be replaced, and the scope of the theatrical rigging improvements will be curtailed. A video camera system will not be installed, and some move and installation work will be removed from the project and completed by our facilities and technology departments. The largest chunk of what is being cut is in the area of furniture, fixtures, and equipment. While we had hoped to replace nearly all of the furniture in the building, most furniture and a significant amount of technology equipment replacement, will be deferred to the future with existing furniture and equipment in the current building being reused.

In summary, while these cuts are difficult and disappointing, they leave all of our core improvements in place, and for the most part represent work that could be added modularly in the future. There may also be opportunities for alternate funding, fund-raising, and other creative solutions to restore some of these features. Without the intention of diminishing the impact of these losses to the project, we need to remember to focus on the ninety percent of the glass that is still full and all the opportunities and benefits we will all - students, staff, and community members - experience when the project is completed. 
