SUPERINTENDENT'S BULLETIN

The Superintendent's Bulletin is posted on the Lincoln Public School website each Wednesday. It provides timely, relevant information about meetings, professional development opportunities, curriculum and program development, grant awards, and School Committee news.

Dear Faculty and Staff,

This message is primarily intended for the Hanscom campus but also serves to inform the district as a whole on what is taking place with regards to the construction of the new Hanscom Primary School.

The original plan set forth in collaboration with the Department of Defense Educational Activity (DoDEA) and the Army Corp of Engineers was to move our current primary school into the temporary facility located on Eglin Road at the end of last school year so that construction of a new Hanscom Primary School could begin during the summer. However, the awarding of a construction contract has been delayed. We are awaiting notification from DoDEA that the Hanscom Primary School construction contract has been awarded and that we may move into the temporary school facility. As a result, we do not yet have certainty about when we will move from the current primary school building into the temporary facility.

The best case scenario was that we would move over the Columbus Day weekend in October; however, the deadline for making that happen has passed. At this point, we are hopeful that we will move over the December recess. If we move over the December recess, additional vacation days for all Hanscom students and Hancom Middle School faculty and staff will be added on December 23rd and January 3rd. Hanscom Primary School and Preschool faculty will work on these days to pack and unpack. Assuming that we will be moving during this school year, we will need to adjust the school calendar to build in two days when students do not attend school, one day for faculty to complete their packing before the move and a second day for faculty to unpack after the move.

To assist families with scheduling vacations and childcare, we will be keeping Hanscom Primary School, including the preschool, and Hanscom Middle School on the same schedule. Hanscom Primary School, including preschool students, and Hanscom Middle School students will not attend school on one day <u>prior</u> to the Primary School move and one day <u>following</u> the Primary School move, whenever the move takes place.

Massachusetts' law requires schools to provide 180 days of instruction each school year. This means that we will need to make-up these two non-student days. There are a few options listed on Page 2.

Make-up day options:

- Add one or two full or half days at the end of the school year in June (last day of school with 5 snow days is June 20).
- Attend school on Rosh Hashanah, October 3st. Faculty who observe the holiday may use a personal day. And, students who observe the holiday will receive an excused absence.
- Attend school on October 12⁺, Yom Kippur. Faculty who observe the holiday may use a personal day. And, students who observe the holiday will receive an excused absence.
- Attend school for a half day on Good Friday, April 14*.
- Shorten February vacation by 1 or 2 days.

Important Information:

- We must meet the state requirement of 180 school days **and** 900 instructional hours. A half day counts as a school day but has fewer instructional hours. We do have the possibility of using half days to make up the two no student days.
- Extending a half day Wednesday does not help because the half days on Wednesdays already count towards our 180 school days.
- We build 5 snow days into the Academic School Year Calendar. If we use all 5 of these snow days, our last student day is June 20, 2017. If we have fewer than five snow days, the June 20 last day of school will be adjusted earlier. Let's hope for a mild winter!
- We cannot hold school on any state or federal holiday, including January 2nd because that is the observance of New Year's Day.

Your input will be extremely important in helping us determine when the two additional school days will be made up. Thank you in advance for completing the survey by noon on Thursday September 8^a. In the event that a move does not take place during this school year and we added two school days, these days would be taken off at the end of the school year.



### IDEAS Course for School Leaders: Supporting Culturally Proficient Classrooms/Schools

This course will use the combined works of Zaretta Hammond (Culturally Responsive Teaching & The Brain), Jim Knight (instructional coaching), Carol Dweck (growth mindset), Randall B. Lindsey, Nuri-Robins, and Raymond D. Terrell (cultural proficiency) to help administrators understand the inner workings of cultural proficiency, its connection to learning and student engagement, growth mindset, racial microaggressions and how to apply these elements to supporting culturally proficient classrooms and schools. Claudia A. Fox Tree facilitates MAALANA, which is entering its tenth year of monthly school year gatherings. It is a space for educators of color to network, support each other, brainstorm about school-related issues of social justice, and share culturally responsive teaching practices. MAALANA also provides an opportunity to share each other's company and enjoy light refreshments.

(MAALANA) educators are <u>Multiracial</u>, <u>A</u>sian, <u>A</u>rab, <u>A</u>frican Descent, <u>L</u>atino/a, and/or <u>N</u>ative <u>A</u>merican teachers, advisors, counselors, administrators, staff, and tutors who are the "only" or "one of few" of their "affinity group" in their building or school system. We see all interactions as "cross cultural communications" and like to meet with other educators of color to talk about students of color.

MAALANA is an affinity group designed to provide opportunities for educators of color from various communities in Massachusetts to share school experiences regarding race, culture, ethnicity, and systemic social change that creates educational equity. Strategies for addressing the academic achievement of children from diverse cultures, preparing all students to successfully navigate a culturally diverse society, and collaboration techniques among colleagues are reviewed and discussed.

Topics are highlighted and resources shared in a monthly electronic summary. Articles and links are selected for relevance to discussions and current issues of social justice. They may be informational, include statistics, list books, link to websites/videos, and/or highlight under-represented voices.

MAALANA is sponsored by IDEAS (Initiatives for Developing Equity and Achievement for Students) through EDCO (Educational Collaborative located in Bedford, MA). 
