Springfield Renaissance School (http://www.springfieldrenaissanceschool.com/) Gr. 6-12, Springfield, MA Renaissance is a small school in the Springfield Public Schools that forms part of a larger school network called EL Education (http://eleducation.org/), formerly Expeditionary Learning). Through EL, we focus on rigor and high expectations, character education, service, leadership, and college preparation.

King Middle School (https://king.portlandschools.org/) Portland, ME, Gr. 6-8, Portland, ME King Middle School serves the most racially, ethnically, and economically diverse neighborhoods in the state of Maine. More than 120 of King's approximately 500 students speak 28 languages and come from 17 countries.

King Middle School is dedicated to the idea that we can create a school where all kids succeed at a high level. Following the EL Learning (http://eleducation.org/) school model, our students engage in eight to twelve-week experiential learning expeditions. These expeditions are in-depth and interdisciplinary in nature and require students to engage in sophisticated research, use the community in authentic ways, and represent their knowledge with high quality products which are presented to authentic audiences.

The National Institute of Health (NIH) reports that one in four 13- to 18-year-olds has had an anxiety disorder in their lifetime. Without intervention, these children are at risk for diminished learning, poor performance, and social/behavioral problems in school.

Jessica Minahan will discuss the importance of understanding the role that anxiety plays in a child's behavior and how using preventive strategies is key to successful intervention.

Jessica Minahan, M.Ed., is a licensed and board-certified behavior analyst (BCBA), special educator, and consultant to schools internationally. Since 2000, she has worked with students who struggle with mental health issues and challenging behavior in public school systems. Her particular interest is to serve these students by combining behavioral interventions with a comprehensive knowledge of best practices for those with complex mental health profiles and learning needs. Ms. Minahan is the author of <u>The Behavior Code</u> with Nancy Rappaport (Harvard Education Press, 2012) and <u>The Behavior Code Companion</u> (Harvard Education Press, 2014).
