Highlighting Great Learning




For the first time in recent history, seventh and eighth grade students from Brooks (through a generous grant from the Lincoln School Foundation) traveled to Hanscom Middle School to participate in a joint assembly held on January 31st. Boston-based Urban Improv role played situations highlighting race and cultural stereotypes; students were invited to jump in to advise or discuss the situation further with the performers. Students then broke into smaller groups, mixing students from both campuses, in order to share a bit of their own backgrounds and discuss what had resonated with them, along with questions they were still pondering. Racism, stereotyping, and cultural equality are tough topics to discuss openly, but the students took the challenge head on. The Lincoln School Foundation was proud to fund this grant and hopes it can be a spring board for future discussions on both campuses.

On Wednesday evening, February 1, Lincoln School 5-8 faculty Jaime Moody, Jenny Nam and Hilary Skelton, with support from Lateefah Franck and Sharon Hobbs, facilitated an evening of dinner and discussion focused on Ta-Nehisi Coates' book, <u>Between the World and Me</u>. The evening provided an opportunity for members of the faculty, administration, and Lincoln and Boston communities to come together to engage in rich conversation about the impact of race on our individual experience and the historical influence on our current society. Thirty-three faculty, parents, and community members spent 90 minutes talking about how the book impacted us and our thinking about race.

The program is offered by the MMEA-ED (Massachusetts Music Educators Association - Eastern District) as an enrichment opportunity, which brings together the top musicians in our schools. Over 1000 outstanding music students in grades 7 - 9, from 30 school districts, auditioned on January 28. It's an honor to participate as fewer than half who auditioned were accepted.

Representing Lincoln Middle School at the Festival, Emily Feng will participate in the first violin section in the Orchestra.

Congratulations to Emily Feng on being accepted and to AJ Zweidler-McKay (euphonium, grade 7), Maia Bergeron (trombone, grade 8), and Tess Hamilton (violin, grade 8) for representing Lincoln School 5-8 in the audition process!

Winter Overnight/Outdoor Club






