Dear Lincoln Public Schools Community,

Jennifer Glass, School Committee Chairperson, will be moving off of the School Committee this term. I want to take this opportunity to recognize Jennifer for the service she has provided to the Lincoln Public Schools over the last ten years. She has served on the Lincoln School Committee since the 2007 – 2008 school year and has chaired the Committee since 2010. The Institute on using the Principles and Practices of SRI Critical Friendship is designed to give educators the background information, skills and practice necessary to effectively lead collegial groups of all kinds, but Especially, those focused on education equity. Participants leave with insights and tools necessary for responsive facilitation and effective collaboration. All who are interested in supporting teacher-directed professional learning are invited to attend.

Have you ever been in a student work session and observed someone pulling out the All Kinds of Minds placemat to analyze the student work, and wish you knew how to use the tool? This course (3days in August, followed by two day in late October when school is in session) supports K-12 educators as they develop a better understanding of how to adapt instruction and design targeted interventions based on students' neurodevelopmental learning profiles.
