# Featured Topic of the Month

Bullying is an ongoing and serious issue in schools for all children but can be especially so for children who have learning differences. According to the American Academy of Child and Adolescent Psychiatry, close to half of all children will experience school bullying at some point while they are in school. At least 10 percent of these children are bullied on a regular basis. Child bullying can be very harmful to children and their self-esteem and self-image in ways that can shape their self-worth for life. Children who are bullied can be repressed emotionally and socially, their schoolwork can fall off and suffer as a result.

### What is bullying?

Bullying is a form of harassment and intimidation towards individuals who are viewed as being weaker. There are several different forms of bullying. They are; physical domination, verbal and emotional. Children can be bullied through emails, on Facebook and text messaging. Boys are more likely to use physical dominance while girls are more likely to use verbal and emotional types of bullying.

### What are the signs of a child who is being bullied?

Some of the signs include:

- Becoming withdrawn and depressed
- Not wanting to go to school
- A sudden drop off in school performance
- Deteriorating self-esteem
- · Loss of appetite
- Sleep disturbance

On the flip side, and of equal importance, parents and teachers should also watch out for the indicators that their child/student is a bully.

### Strategies for helping your child respond to a school bully.

Let your child know that you are on his or her side, and that the bullying is not their fault. Here are some ways to help child:

- 1. Go together to school authorities to see what can be done in terms of mediation, and in terms of increased attention paid on the school grounds.
- 2. Encourage the child to avoid the child bully, and seek help from a teacher or trusted adult when necessary.
- 3. Practice being assertive and asking the bully to leave the child alone.
- 4. Encourage your child to play with true friends bullies are less apt to pick on children who are in a group.
