### **Compiled Faith Leader Questions**

- 1. What faith/cultural tradition do you represent and what denomination? What is your role/title? Where is your church/temple/synagogue/mosque/other based?
- 2. When is the holiday typically observed and does it vary from year to year?
- 3. What is the historical and spiritual significance of the holiday in your faith tradition?
- 4. Do members of the community ever express concern about having to choose between observances and participation in school?
- 5. What are the key customs, rituals, or religious practices associated with the holiday?
  - a. What time of day does this typically take place?
  - b. Is it a widely observed ceremony/service led or presided over by a faith leader?
- 6. What would it mean both practically and symbolically to your community if key days of observances were acknowledged in some way in the school calendar?
  - a. How does the community, including more secular families, celebrate or observe the relevant holiday(s) otherwise?
- 7. What religious/cultural observances from your faith/cultural tradition fall during the school year?
  - a. When school is in session during an observed holiday, how do you perceive the emotional, communal, and academic effects on members of your community?
  - b. What benefits do the students gain academically or emotionally when the holiday is acknowledged or school is closed?
  - c. If closing school is not possible, what alternative accommodations would best support students of your faith/culture?
  - d. To what extent do children and families refrain from regular activities like work or school on this religious/cultural holiday?
- 8. Are there any unintended consequences, benefits, or broader considerations we should be aware of when evaluating this holiday for school calendar changes?
- 9. Are there other actions that you believe would help members of your community feel seen and respected concerning these days of observance?



### Summary of NSBA Guidance on School Holiday Recognition

The National School Boards Association (NSBA) has not issued a binding policy for public schools religious observances, but has provided resources for school boards and administrators to understand constitutional constraints and best practices.

### **Constitutional and Legal Compliance**

NSBA emphasizes that public schools must comply with the Establishment Clause of the First Amendment, which requires governmental neutrality toward religion. Decisions about recognizing holidays should be grounded in state and federal law, not religious tradition. Recognizing only federal and state holidays provides clarity and reduces risk of legal challenge related to endorsement of a particular faith.

### **Practical and Administrative Considerations**

NSBA notes that decisions about school closures should prioritize operational factors. Attendance data is a key consideration: if large portions of the student body and staff are likely to be absent, districts may consider closure. Otherwise, maintaining the school schedule supports instructional time and continuity. Using attendance thresholds rather than religious observances ensures decisions are made based on objective, secular data.

### Individual Religious Accommodation

NSBA recommends providing individual accommodations rather than systemic closures for specific religious observances, NSBA highlights that districts can support individual students' and staff members' rights by providing excused absences for religious observance. This approach respects diverse faith practices while keeping the overall school calendar consistent. Policies should be transparent, equitable, and applied consistently across all religions.

### Summary of MA DESE Guidance on School Holiday Recognition

School committees have discretion over the school calendar but must comply with state law.

Massachusetts General Laws, Chapter 4 Section 7, requires that all public offices, including public schools, must be closed on statewide legal holidays.

Massachusetts General Laws, Chapter 151B, Section 4(1A) and Chapter 151C, Section 2B, requires that students and employees be excused from school, without penalty, if they miss school for religious observances.

Massachusetts Department of Elementary and Secondary Education (DESE) advises that calendar decisions consider educational time-on-learning requirements and consistency across the school year.

- Mock Calendars: Based on this consensus, each Committee should prepare a mock calendar to include in the Tri-District agenda packet. These mock calendars will serve as starting points for comparison.
- Half Days for Religious and Cultural Observances: Each School Committee may also wish to discuss its approach to half days tied to religious and cultural observances.
