The METCO Program



Started with parent engagement...

The METCO Program (Metropolitan Council for Educational Opportunities) was founded in 1966. The METCO Program is open to children from all backgrounds and cultures who are domiciled in the city of Boston. It is a voluntary program and enrollment into the program begins at METCO Headquarters Inc. in Roxbury.

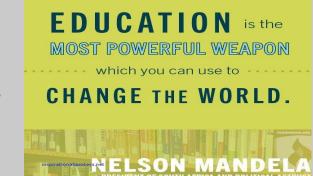
In 1966, the first 220 students, aged 5 to 16, rode buses from Boston neighborhoods to schools in seven suburbs: **Arlington, Braintree, Brookline, Lexington, Lincoln, Newton,** and **Wellesley.** This academic school year marks the 53rd year of the Town of Lincoln's participation in the METCO Program.

METCO Program in Lincoln

The Lincoln METCO Program is comprised of families from diverse ethnic, cultural, religious, and socio-economic backgrounds with a range of educational strengths and needs.

The Lincoln METCO Program helps students and families become a community of learners, better prepared to meet their academic, social, and emotional challenges; some of which may be unique to Boston resident students.

The Lincoln METCO staff partner with the students to help each of them cultivate a positive mindset, their voice, and self-efficacy.

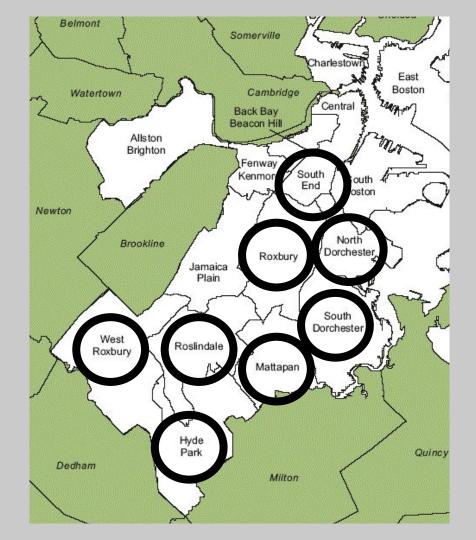

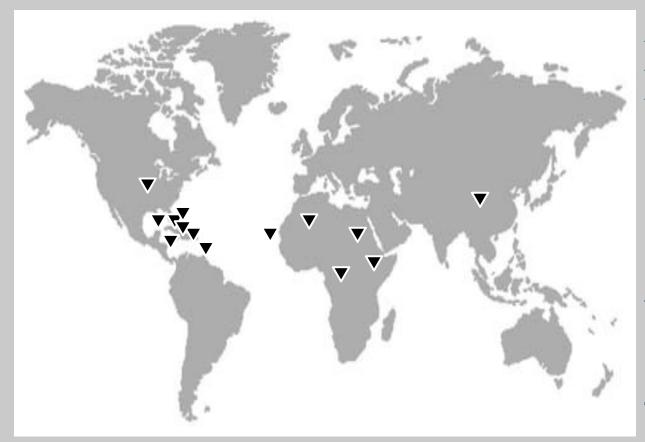
Boston towns being represented

Top 10 Student Challenges

- 1. Early mornings/long days
- 2. Long bus rides
- 3. Social-emotional stress from stereotype threat and microaggressions
 - a. Microassault- deliberate discriminatory behavior, microinsult-"can you swim?", & microinvalidation
 - "I don't see color"
- 4. Feelings of isolation/meaninglessness
- 5. Code switching confusion
- 6. Feeling/Being misunderstood
- 7. Peer comparison (w/Lincoln residents)
 - a. Internal identity struggles
- 8. Coping with change
- 9. Stress: trying to keep up and start up
- 10. Difficulty relating to teachers/peers

Current Steps: Student Support

Lunch Bunches:

- Provide time for students to take a load off
- Provide a safe space for children to come together in an environment where they make up the majority
 - Helpful to students of color who are in classes where they are one of only a few students of color
- Positive environment for students to explore their affinity experience and discuss topics pertinent to them with a sense of ease
- Agenda is driven by the needs of the students
 - Topics vary, but many times the lunch is free flowing

Current Steps: Student Support

- Hold one-on-one student meetings to encourage student advocacy
- Extension offering on Mondays and Fridays to develop leadership skills and self-efficacy (Middle School)
- METCO rep attends SST/IST meetings to partner with teachers and offer supports for both the student and teacher
 - Keep cultural knowledge at the forefront to help stakeholders have a social-emotional connection to the student and understand the behavior in light of experience
- METCO rep attends IEP meetings
- Follow up with teachers on students' missing assignments or progress
 - o Ensure after school homework club time is effectively used
 - o Follow up on progress so that students can be spotlighted



Current Steps: Culturally Responsive

- METCO in the classroom
 - "Celebrating to avoid Tolerating"
 - Meeting with teachers to discuss cultural lens
- Created Mentor/Mentee opportunities for middle school students to connect with K-4 students
- November attendance at Disruptive Equity Education Project (DEEP) via School Reform Initiative
- MDA Conference 2019
 - District scheduled to send 10 staff/faculty to the annual METCO
 Directors Conference on December 6th
 - ***SHOUT OUT***: MCC for sponsoring 3 faculty
 - All participants will attend a Diversity Think Tank on December 9th

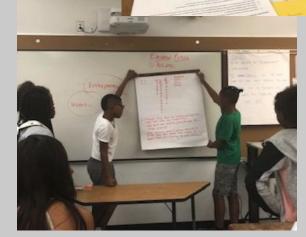

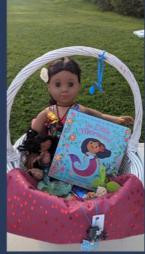

- Runs throughout the academic year until May 28th

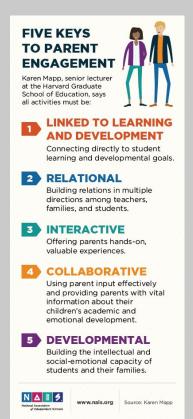


Current Steps: Parent/Faculty Engagement

- Monthly Lincoln METCO "Siren" Newsletter
 - Distributed to faculty, staff, & Lincoln/Boston parents

- Enhanced communications for Parents
 - Robo Calls for delays, parent meetings, etc.
 - IT working on text messaging...stay tuned
 - Email/call parents with student updates/highlights
 - Parent/Guardian meetings mapped out for the school year and communicated in advance
- Attend K-8 Team Meetings
 - Student concerns/Spotlights
 - Problem solving
 - Develop partnerships with faculty



Next Steps: Vision

- Maintain a welcoming and collaborative environment
 - Ensure <u>EVERY</u> student feels welcomed
 - Create opportunities to build community
 - Retain/maintain cohort of students
- Focus on Improving Student Achievement
- Increased Parent/Guardian Engagement
- Improved Bus Experience



Action Steps - Creating Welcoming Space

- Work with 5-8 students/faculty to develop METCO book (celebrating METCO)
- Work with Principal Collmer/faculty on developing lesson plans for K-2
 - Infuse cultural identity work early on
 - Focus on "Who Am I?"
 - Birth Name Meaning
 - Celebrate Differences/Diversity
 - Orient all students to METCO program
 - Incorporate importance of empathy
 - Goal: Get students to see the human before "the Boston"
- Create more opportunities for student facilitated affinity groups
- Develop a platform for students to share "their voice and heart" and for teachers to listen
- Invited Lincoln Parks & Rec Dept to the table
 - o Identify ways to align after school activities in order to build community

Action Steps - Improve Student Achievement

- Help students cultivate a positive mindset
 - Balance giving students "CARE" and "PUSH"
- Increase involvement of teachers/tutors in the after school homework/tutoring
 - Help teachers to build relationships & recognize students' cultural learning in order to constructively respond to their needs...strengthens student connectedness to learning
 - Working with principals to assess plan for school-wide after school enrichment
- Introduce students to the benefits of advocating for themselves and seeking extra help from teachers outside of class time
- Partner with community organizations
 - Provide resources for parents to utilize during the winter, spring, and summer breaks
 - Ex. CROC Center take advantage of tutoring resources in Boston to avoid long days for students
- Connect continuing students to METCO Inc. Summer Program at Roxbury HQ

Action Steps: Student Achievement

Tenacity Challenge:

- Annual academic competition for teams of 7th and 8th grade Latino & African-American students around 3 themes: leadership, empowerment, & tenacity
- Benefits:
 - Build academic capacity
 - Strengthen intellectual risk-taking
 - Hone leadership skills through an action project
 - Develop enduring peer and faculty relationships
- Competition: March 7, 2020
- Students prepare for 3 events:
 - Leadership Action Project
 - Math Quiz Bowl Challenge
 - Global Voices Literary Analysis



Action Steps - Parent/Guardian Engagement

- Launch Parent E-Board ~ January 2020
 - Parent Liaison for each school (K-4 & 5-8)
 - Create Family Directory
 - Assist each other (i.e. in cold months, offer a child with no car, a seat in warm car)
 - Explore starting a "Partner Family" Program (aka Host Family)
 - Develop partnerships
 - Parent E-Board, MCC, & PTO to plan yearly social events that build community
 - Build community = Increase engagement
- Increase attendance at Boston parent/guardian meetings
- Co-host (2) Lincoln Parent/Guardian Meetings with PTO
 - Next meeting: March 19, 2020 at midpoint location
- Build/foster teacher and parent connections using unconventional methods
 - (i.e. FaceTime, Skype, etc. for parent/teacher conferences)

Action Steps - Improved Bus Experience

- Partner with Mental Health Team
 - Developing bus curriculum with a focus on Social Emotional Learning
- Bus Monitor Trainings Partnering with Sudbury
 - Follow-up trainings scheduled for January 15th & May 27th
 - Mental Health Team will teach "mindfulness" tips so monitors can help students better

transition into the school day

- Create Incentive Program
 - Bus with least conduct slips (each month)
 wins a pizza party or ice cream social in
 June
- Acquire items to keep students engaged
 - o Borrow a Book
 - Gimp/Embroidery thread
 - Word puzzles/searches
